Discover the Art of Wood-Fired Kilns in Bizen: A Hands-On Workshop

Step into the heart of traditional Japan, and immerse yourself in the beautiful world of Bizen pottery. This unique workshop invites you to experience the deep-rooted heritage of this town's pottery pottery while learning about the fascinating techniques behind wood firing—a method that has been passed down from generation to generation for centuries.

What You'll Experience:

- Hands-On Kiln Firing: Learn the intricate process of preparing and firing a wood kiln. You'll help stack the kiln, understand wood selection, and experience the mesmerizing stages of firing.
- Traditional Bizen Techniques: Discover the classic methods that give Bizen
 pottery its distinct character—unadorned, raw beauty, achieved through natural
 ash glazing.
- Guidance from Local Masters: Work alongside Master Taiga Mori, third-generation ceramic artist from Bizen, as well as other seasoned Bizen potters who will guide you through the art of clay preparation, shaping, kiln preparation (packing, stacking, etc) and firing. You'll gain insights from local potters deeply rooted in this very unique technique.
- **Community and Connection**: Join fellow pottery enthusiasts in this intimate setting. Together, you'll share knowledge, stories, and a passion for the age-old tradition of pottery.

Who This Workshop Is For:

The number of participants is limited to 12 people. This workshop is perfect for potters and ceramic enthusiasts of all levels who want to deepen their understanding of wood-firing techniques and the Bizen style. Whether you are a beginner or have experience in pottery, you'll leave with a richer appreciation of this time-honored craft.

Why Bizen?

Bizen is one of Japan's oldest pottery towns, renowned for its unglazed, earthy ceramics that are fired over long durations in traditional kilns. There's something truly magical

about creating pottery in a place where history and innovation come together, surrounded by a community of potters keeping this craft alive.

IMPORTANT: Please keep in mind that firing a kiln is a team effort and can be quite labor-intensive and physically demanding throughout the entire process—before, during, and after. It's all about coming together as a community to make it happen!

We will work around the clock in up to 6-hour shifts to feed the kiln and other related work - please keep it in mind as you approach this unique but challenging experience.

Good communication and teamwork go a long way in keeping things running smoothly and tackling any challenges with ease.

Your Artwork or Pottery

You can bring up to 2 shoe boxes of your work to be fired! Make sure your pieces are made from high-fire stoneware clay and/or porcelain. For this firing (a high-fire glaze firing), stoneware with a high iron content isn't ideal. If you are coming to the wheel-throwing course you don't need to bring any pieces as we will be making them there! There will be an opportunity for those who only come to the wood firing course to make some small pieces the first 2 days. Remember, smaller or delicate pieces might be at risk of cracking, warping, or tipping over, so if possible, try to bring a mix of sizes for flexibility during the stacking process.

Wild Clay work

We are likely to have access to local masters who work with wild clay, and might be able to make a few pieces with it - To Be Confirmed nearer the date as the process of harvesting wild clay is very weather-dependent.

Other Things to Bring

Warm, Natural Fiber Clothing

Make sure to pack warm clothes made strictly from natural fibers—synthetic fabrics can be dangerous around the fire, as they're highly flammable. Comfortable shoes are also a must for those long hours of work.

Safety Gear

If you'd like, bring a dust mask with a respirator for the cleaning phase after the firing. Eye protection, such as dark glasses or welding goggles, can also come in handy.

Personal Tools & Extras

Feel free to bring your favorite apron and any special tools you enjoy working with. A notebook or sketchbook, along with things for writing or drawing, can be great for capturing ideas and notes during the process.

Meals and Dietary Needs

Please let us know if you have any dietary needs or restrictions—we're happy to accommodate where possible!

Lunch will be provided daily, featuring simple yet delicious Japanese-style meals. We'll be enjoying our lunches together as a group, which is always a great time to connect and share.

For dinner (not included), there are a few local options in town, as well as a supermarket just a few blocks from the workshop where you can pick up food. Keep in mind that Bizen is a small town, so choices are limited—but rest assured, they're tasty!

Accommodation during the Workshop:

The workshop does not include accommodation, but we're collaborating with local hotels to secure discounts for our participants. If you're interested in sharing a room to help keep costs down, let us know, and we'll do our best to match **you** with someone and accommodate your budget.

Workshop Costs and Details

Cost of the Workshop

• 4000€ (10% Special discount if you book it before Feb 1st!)

Included:

- Wood fired materials and clay for small pieces (if desired)
- Welcome dinner, all lunches and daily snacks
- Travel chaperone to the optional activities

Not Included:

- Accommodation (see options provided)
- Flights to and from Japan
- Transfers to and from Bizen (nearest train station is Inbe)
- Alcohol and other spirits during lunches

Payment Details:

- A non-refundable deposit of 500€ is required to secure your spot.
- The final balance must be paid by March 15th.
- If the workshop is canceled, you will receive a 100% refund.

How to Get to Bizen, Japan

Bizen is located in Okayama Prefecture and can be easily reached by plane, train, car, or bus. The nearest major airports are Kansai International Airport (Osaka), Okayama Airport, and Tokyo airports (Haneda or Narita).

By Plane

The region is served by three main airports:

- Kansai International Airport (KIX): A major hub with international flights from cities worldwide. From here, you can take the Shinkansen (bullet train) to Okayama Station (approximately 2 hours).
- Okayama Airport (OKJ): A smaller regional airport with domestic flights and limited international connections. From Okayama Airport, you can reach Okayama City by bus or taxi and continue to Bizen.
- Tokyo (Haneda or Narita Airports): Both airports offer domestic flights to Okayama Airport (approximately 1.5 hours). Alternatively, you can take the Shinkansen from Tokyo Station to Okayama Station (approximately 3.5–4 hours).

By Train

- From Tokyo: Take the Shinkansen (bullet train) from Tokyo Station to Okayama Station. The journey takes approximately 3.5–4 hours.
- From Osaka: Take the Shinkansen from Shin-Osaka Station to Okayama Station (approximately 45 minutes).

From Okayama Station, transfer to the JR Ako Line and take a local train to Imbe Station (approximately 30 minutes). Imbe Station is the closest station to Bizen and the heart of the pottery district.

By Bus or Car

- Long-distance buses are available from major cities to Okayama. From there, you can take a local bus or taxi to Bizen.
- By car, Bizen is accessible via the Sanyo Expressway, making it a convenient drive from cities like Okayama, Kobe, or Osaka.
